YOUR WATER TRAIL ADVENTURES BEGIN HERE


The Pierre Part Belle River Water Trails are for canoe and kayak paddlers, as well as all recreational boaters. And, in so many ways, they are for everyone. Residents and visitors. Young and old. Bird watchers, nature lovers, photographers, and anyone who seeks peace and tranquility.

Here are the basics:

 Seven designated Water Trails follow natural bayous and man-made channels.


- All seven Water Trails begin right here at Veteran's Park.
- Water Trail routes vary in length and time required to paddle.
- The Water Trails have distance markers installed at 1.0 mile (1.6 km) increments.
- Each Water Trail is named for a local bird which you might see when out on the water.
- Some Water Trails end at an intersection with one of the other seven trails. Others end with a launch ramp or dock.





Depart from Veterans Park paddle along one of the seven Water Trails as far as you wish, turn around, and return here to Veterans Park







Paddle a loop of your choice departing here, following a Water Trail route, intersect with another Water Trail route, and return here to Veterans Park.





Launch your trip on a Water Trail at any acceptable location and paddle to a legitimate departure location



NORTHERN CARDINAL WATER TRAIL Waterways of the Northern Cardinal Water Trail: Bayou Pierre Part, Tet Loc, and Oil Field Canals | INTERMEDIATE

The tucked-in neck and long legs of the four-foot-tall Great Blue Heron do not

hinder this stately bird from living well along our waterways. It strikes quickly to

grab a fish or rodent for a fresh meal.

With its distinctive red color and a profile people can't take their eyes off, the Northern Cardinal has perhaps inspired more to open a bird field guide than any other bird. In this area, you can see a Northern Cardinal year-round.

Great Egret | Ardea alba

GREAT EGRET WATER TRAIL

Waterways of the Great Egret Water Trail: Bayou Pierre Part, Tet Bay, and

Pipeland Canal | BEGINNER

A dazzling sight, the elegant white Great Egret inspired the conservation and first laws to protect birds. While wading along in the water, a quick jab of its yellow bill to an unsuspecting fish supplies the meal of the day.

WOOD DUCK WATER TRAIL

Waterways of the Wood Duck Water Trail: Bayou Pierre Part, Tet Loc, Oil Field

Canals, and Bayou Alcide | INTERMEDIATE

Wood Duck | Aix sponsa "Stunning" is one word to describe the feather colors and patterns for each the female and male Wood Duck. For nesting, they rely on crevasses in large trees or Wood Duck nest boxes installed along many of our waterways.

Waterways of the Bald Eagle Water Trail: Bayou Pierre Part, Bayou Grosbec,

Grand Bayou, and Bayou Corne | DIFFICULT Bald Eagle | Haliaeetus leucocephalus

Chosen as the national symbol for the United States in 1782, the Bald Eagle soars in solitude and protection over our waterways. Once endangered, they are now thriving in Louisiana and across the country. Look for their nests high in Bald Cypress Trees.



BROWN PELICAN WATER TRAIL

Total Trail Length: 14.2 mi

Waterways of the Brown Pelican Water Trail: Bayou Pierre Part, Bayou Grosbec, Bayou Nachez, Big Goddel Bayou, and Belle River | DIFFICULT

Brown Pelican | Pelecanus occidentalis

When Louisiana chose the Brown Pelican as its state bird in 1966, this elegant bird faced extinction due to pesticides. With positive effects of regulation, the species now flourishes across the Pelican State. Watch as they dive to fill their bill with fish.



OSPREY WATER TRAIL

Total Trail Length: 8.2 mi

Waterways of the Osprey Water Trail: Bayou Pierre Part, Bayou Grosbec, and Lake

Verret | DIFFICULT

Osprey | Pandion haliaetus When an Osprey spots a prey fish, it hovers over the water and waits until it's in the perfect position to quickly dive in for the catch. You may see Osprey flying with a fish in their talons or perched atop a tree with the catch of the day.



Troy Landry is the quintessential Cajun swamp man. From November to July, he makes his living in the crawfish industry, buying from local fishermen and distributing throughout Louisiana. But when September rolls around, it's all alligators all the time. Troy and his son, Jacob, spend their days hunting wild gators and running a huge warehouse where local trappers can store their catches. At night, they fry up fresh alligator meat on Troy's houseboat or take their boat on a bayou pub crawl, stopping at all their favorite watering holes. Thanks in part to his frequent parties, Troy is one of the most prominent residents of Pierre Part and his son seems to be following in his footsteps.


